Dear Friends,

Advent is a time of waiting, hoping, and longing. What are you longing and waiting for? Are you holding on to hope?

But perhaps also, for some of us, Advent may end up being a time of cynicism, disillusionment and even despair. A hopeful message about the future might be met with a response such as "Yeah right! As if that's ever going to happen."

In the days leading up to the birth of Christ, those listening to the much-repeated hopeful prophesies of Isaiah might have felt equally cynical.

"Every warrior's boot used in battle and every garment rolled in blood will be destined for burning, will be fuel for the fire. For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." (Isaiah 9:5-6)

In the years since these words were first heard, there were sometimes in the story of their people that they could look back on, when it seemed that a glimmer of what Isaiah spoke of was seen, but never fully.

And now, under the brutal occupation of the Roman Empire, to many people Isaiah's dream of the just and peaceful kingdom seemed as far-fetched as ever. And yet for some people, like Elizabeth and Zechariah, Mary and Joseph, and even some humble shepherds, the dream remained alive.

The very idea that God may be at work in a new way through a baby born in an obscure place, to a humble unknown family, would seem utterly ridiculous to the cynical, "Yeah right – as if that's going to make a difference!"

But to others, their hope caused them to act, to move, to embrace change, scary though it was.

So, this Advent, as we give thanks for the hopeful vision of the prophets and all those who prepared the way, can we choose to be cynical about our cynicism, and allow the light of hope to burn a little brighter within us as we join in the journey to the manger, and beyond.

Bible a Month: China

"You will seek me, and you will find me because you will seek me with all your heart" Jeremiah 19, vs 13 (GNB)

China covers an area of 3.7 million square miles, which makes it 40 times bigger than the UK. It is a vast country surrounded by North Korea, Russia, Mongolia, Kazakhstan, Pakistan, and India. The population is 1,411 million. Languages include Simplified Chinese (written format) and Mandarin (spoken format), local dialects and minority languages. The literacy rate is 96.8%.

Right now, thanks to your support, five Bible translation projects in minority languages are underway in China. And Bible Society is also waiting the approval of the authorities to publish a Bible translation that was completed in late 2021 for communities in the region of China called Inner Mongolia.

During the Cultural Revolution, Bibles were burned., but in 1987 with permission from the authorities we helped establish a Bible printing press, amity Press, in Nanjing city. Since then more than 90 million bibles have been printed there for distribution in China.

There are restrictions on religious activity in China but many local authorities trust us so when a church in China asks for help, bible Society often gets the green light to support them. This means Bible translation and literacy programmes, the provision of gospel outreach materials, and support for Bible students and training pastors all happens. It takes a local translation team more than a decade to complete a full Bible and during that time they need to be supported, i.e. paid a modest salary. Your giving means Bible Society can plan far into the future and launch these long-term projects. Thank you!

From the Bible a Month newsletter, Winter 2023-24...

Eyewitness Report from China by Arleen Luo, Manager of Asia and Chinese Mission.

Arleen Luo tells us about her recent visit to remote villages in the mountains of south-west China to see how the Wa ethnic minority community are engaging with their newly translated Bibles. Bao Bao'ai was one of many she met whose lives have been transformed.

Bao 'ai was born into a Christian family, but during China's cultural revolution, when Bibles were destroyed, he was left disconnected with his faith. And when his wife fell ill, he resorted to superstitious healing rituals. "I offered prayers to idols, sacrificing chickens, pigs and bulls heads" Bao'ai said. The rituals didn't work. At that time there were few Scriptures available in Bao'ai's village and those that were there were written in an old script that few people understood.

But in 2016 a translation of the full Bible arrived in the Wa language. This translation, made possible by the regular giving of Bible a Month subscribers, transformed the entire community.

Bao'ai says, "When I didn't have a Bible, I lacked a clear understanding of God's will and guidance. Relying solely on my own thoughts and ideas, I made decisions that were not pleasing to God. After reading the Bible, I felt a surge of strength and empowerment. It was as if I had awakened from the darkness and gained clarity."

Now, small Bible Study groups are widespread in the villages. Bao took his son who was a drug addict to one of these groups. His son repented of his sins, and his wife returned to him. Witnessing the remarkable transformation in the son's life, she came to faith too. Now Bao'ai's whole family study Scripture together.

"We immersed ourselves in its pages, reading it day after day as a family, to the point where the Bible has become worn and weathered. Reading the Bible has been immensely beneficial to me personally. Previously I did not know God and his will. Now I know him better. I have taken it upon myself to lead my son and daughter-in-law in this journey of studying and understanding God's word.

Translating a Bible is no easy task, especially in a remote area of China. First, a Bible Society team visits a region to learn of the Scripture needs from our church partner. Where there is a need for Bible translation, we will then come in to support their local translation team. Then we need to support that team over many years as they translate the entire Bible. This will include conducting Bible translation workshops and training, providing translation consultation, supporting the translators' living allowance. During our next follow up visits we gauge the next step in the translation of Scriptures for the community, and this is often pastor training coupled with the translation of a Study Bible. Our goal at Bible Society is not to just translate the Bible into as many languages as possible, but to see whole communities engage with the scriptures.

Colours of Christmas

For as long as we can remember, red and green have been the colours associated with Christmas, and are the colours that we traditionally decorate our homes with during the holiday season. But few people realize why these complementary hues represent the popular holiday or where its origins begin. This traditional colour scheme has a history rooted in symbolism, and religion. Here's what you need to know about the classic red and green Christmas colour palette.

Celtics and the Winter Solstice

It started centuries ago with ancient Celtic people who revered red-and green-coloured holly plants for surviving the winter. They believed that holly kept the earth beautiful during winter, so they decorated their homes with it during Winter Solstice celebrations to bring protection and good luck to their families. This tradition transformed into a similar version of today's festive red and green Christmas decor.

Symbols in Christianity

Throughout the Bible, red and green symbolize the life of Jesus. Red is the blood of Jesus Christ, and green is the evergreen tree, representing eternal life as it stays this colour throughout the winter. These two colours also represent the leaves and holly berries embodying the crown of thorns on Jesus' head on the cross.

Although red and green dominate the Christmas season, additional colours are still significant at this time of the year, like white, gold, silver, and blue. Here are a few other common colours and their meanings.

White

In the Bible, white refers to purity, light, and holiness associated with Christmas time. Additionally, white is the colour of freshly fallen snow seen in winter months.

Gold and Silver

Gold and silver are also typical hues found in Christmas decor. They represent the gifts from the wise men to Jesus, which included gold. Gold is also the colour typically used in art for the Star of Bethlehem the wise men followed to Jesus' birth.

Blue

In Christianity, Mary, the mother of Jesus, is typically depicted in art wearing blue signifying her importance as the mother of Jesus. This is because, in Biblical times, blue hues of dye were extremely rare and expensive, and only the wealthy could afford them. Additionally, blue also is associated with winter ice and snow.

I've had a good life really.

I've had a good life really. My master was a kind man, and his wife was very beautiful. We all lived quite comfortably, and everything looked great until the Romans decided we had to move to Bethlehem. I didn't understand much – after all I'm only a donkey.

I did know that the mistress was about to have a baby, and that we all had a long way to go. I was to carry her while the master walked. Some parts of the road were very rough and there was a lot of traffic – everyone seemed to be on the move. I tried to be very careful and not to miss a step so that the mistress and her baby would have as smooth a ride as possible.

When we got to Bethlehem the master tried everywhere to find somewhere to stay. There were so many people and we arrived late in the evening. We were all so very tired. While the master was talking to yet another inn keeper, I noticed his stable and I was so tired that I tried to get in to it. The inn keeper saw that and said the family could stay there, so we all went in and gratefully sank to the floor.

Not long afterwards, the mistress had her baby, and wrapped him up in a piece of cloth which they had brought with them. The only place they had to use as a bed was my manger, but I didn't mind that. This all seemed to be a special night.

We were all settling down hoping to get some sleep, when there was a knocking at the door and some shepherds came in bringing some sheep. I didn't understand what they said or how they knew about the baby, but it was obvious they thought he was very special.

We stayed in Bethlehem, and everything settled down for a while. Then there was a bit of a stir in the village. Three very rich men had arrived, and they were asking around looking for a newborn baby. When they saw us they behaved very oddly. They were rich and powerful men, and we were poor carpenters. They left some special gifts for the baby, and then they went back home after they had had some discussions which I didn't understand, but they needed some directions.

The next morning the master said we had to pack up and go to another country and there was no time to lose. Well, that's what donkeys do. I carried the mistress and the baby once again, this time in a great hurry. It seemed that some soldiers were chasing us, but we managed to get to safety – just in time. We heard afterwards what the soldiers did in Bethlehem.

That was a long time ago and I had retired as I thought. One day, two men came and saw my new master and said someone needed me. They took me to a wandering preacher, and I thought I sort of recognised him. They put him on my back and lead me into the city. There was a great celebration. People were throwing palm leaves in front of us and making a huge fuss. It was great to receive such a welcome. There were a few people who didn't seem very happy about it all, but the crowd didn't pay much attention to them.

Now I have gone back to retirement.

Preventing aid to those in need is a death sentence.

Unless humanitarian access is granted to Gaza, and there is a cessation of violence, thousands of people will suffer.

Our partners tell us that the medical supplies are running out, and that food and water are increasingly scarce. Yet since the conflict broke out, no aid – not a drop of water or a grain of wheat – has entered Gaza.

Following the violence that escalated on the morning of Saturday October 7, at least 1,300 Israelis have been killed by militants and nearly 3,000 Palestinians have died in Gaza following days of airstrikes and bombardments by Israel.

The situation facing civilians in Gaza has been made even worse by a full siege, which is depriving more than two million people, half of whom are children, of food, water and electricity.

Why do civilians in Gaza need humanitarian aid?

Thousands have been injured and killed because of airstrikes that have caused widespread destruction of homes, schools, healthcare facilities and telecommunication installations.

Hospitals, already at breaking point, are now overwhelmed by casualties. With Gaza's only power plant run out of fuel, our partners have confirmed cuts are affecting hospitals, closing food supply to shops and access to water and sanitation services.

It's thought that one million people, around half the population, have now been displaced inside Gaza, including over 300,000 people who are sheltering in UN-run schools.

One of our partners whose centre has been transformed into a shelter told us, 'We have been evacuated to Khan Yunis... It is not easy at all. This is the first time in my life I have experienced what it means to be a refugee. What it feels like to be evacuated from your home and not knowing when you will come back.'

Words alone simply cannot paint the picture of the scale of human suffering in Khan Yunis. Hundreds of thousands of people fled there in recent days to seek refuge from the worst of the violence but were met last night with airstrikes.

Our partners in Gaza are ready to respond when access is allowed.

Wilfully impeding relief supplies constitutes a war crime under international law. It amounts to a death sentence for those trapped in Gaza. Thousands of innocent civilians in Gaza are being increasingly imperiled not only by airstrikes, but by hunger and thirst, as its people endure a second week of total siege.

What will happen in Gaza without humanitarian access?

'Without humanitarian access, Christian Aid and our partners will be prevented from acting on the scale required. Aid can only reach those most in need in Gaza at scale once the crossings open and the bombs stop falling,' explains William Bell. (Christian Aid's Head of Middle East Policy) As the crisis continues to unfold, the people of Gaza are in need of:

Food Shelter Sanitation Protection.

However, right now, it's extremely dangerous to move around, and supplies of essentials are running perilously low. To respond at scale, we need unfettered humanitarian access.

Our established partners in Gaza are ready to respond with medical relief and community-led initiatives as soon as humanitarian access is allowed. Without it, thousands of people face serious illness and death, as supplies of food, health equipment and clean water run out.




